

TRIGGER THE RIPPLE EFFECT OF GUN VIOLENCE

"You shall not murder." The Sixth Commandment. When God gave the stone tablets to Moses, they were divided in half. The first five Commandments deal with our relationship with God. The second five have to do with our relationship with each other. And the first commandment on the second list states "you shall not murder." It's one of the commandments that most people remember. Most of us don't need it. That is, no one has to tell us not to kill someone else. No one has to write that rule down. We already know that.

But murder continues to happen in America every day. And it happens too often without thinking, without even choosing a victim. Gun violence happens in schools around the country, in movie theaters, in shopping malls, on military property, in neighborhoods like yours and mine, and the perpetrators just started firing, aiming sometimes at people they don't even know.

So, on two Wednesdays in August – the 20th and the 27th, your Christian Ed Committee has voted to show a documentary film, followed by conversation, about gun violence in America. It's not about the Second Amendment. No one will ask you to give up your guns, or to vote against having them. It's about violence. If you are a responsible gun owner, then this film is for you. If you are a gun advocate, then this film is for you. If you disagree with having guns in the home, then this film is for you.

Produced by the Presbyterians for Disaster Assistance (PDA), *Trigger* shares the story of how gun violence impacts individuals and communities and examines the "ripple effect" that one shooting has on a survivor, a family, a community and a society. *Trigger* also addresses the critical issue of gun violence prevention by moving the conversation away from the polarizing extremes that have long dominated the debate, and lifting up the voices of those who seek a new way forward.

Please save the dates and come to this vitally important conversation. Perhaps we as a church cannot do anything about gun violence. But perhaps we can. Perhaps no one will hear us when we state our opinion. But perhaps they will. Perhaps this will never happen in Henderson.

Wednesday, August 20th and Wednesday August 27th. We will have a light dinner together, provided by the C.E. Committee, we will watch this documentary together in two meetings, and we will follow each presentation in dialog with each other. It's time to talk. This is not the behavior that God wants our community to experience.

EAST TEXAS DISCUSSION OF 221ST GENERAL ASSEMBLY



A gathering at the First Presbyterian Church in Kilgore was held on Sunday afternoon, July 20, to discuss the June meeting of the 221st General Assembly in Detroit. Grace Presbytery East Texas Commissioners present were Ruling Elders Carole Cook of Jacksonville and Tom Sartor of Kilgore and Teaching Elder Shane Webb of Mt. Pleasant. Alternate Commissioner present was Ruling Elder Kathy Porter of Henderson. Members of Grace Presbytery Staff present were General Presbyter Jan DeVries, Stated Clerk Gerry Tyer,

Director of Cross Cultural Mission and Ministry Joanna Kim. Gerry Tyer moderated the meeting.

Gerry Tyer put forth the topics and asked Commissioners to speak to the topic and then asked for questions from the audience. The first topic was same-sex marriage. The GA adopted an "authoritative interpretation of the constitution to grant pastors discretion in determining whether or not to conduct same-gender marriages in civil jurisdictions where such marriages are legal." This interpretation went into effect on June 22. A constitutional amendment to the

Book of Order was proposed that would change the definition of marriage from "between a man and a woman" to "between two people, traditionally between a man and a woman." Any change in the constitution requires approval from a majority of the denomination's 172 presbyteries—a process that takes roughly a year. The vote will be taken in Grace Presbytery at the March 2015 meeting.

Also to be voted upon in Grace Presbytery at the same March meeting will be the Belhar Confession which the GA recommended for ratification and addition to the *Book of Confession* which will require a two-thirds vote of the 172 presbyteries.

The closest vote of the Assembly came on the issue of divestment from Caterpillar, Hewlett-Packard, and Motorola, 310 in favor and 303 against. The recommendation to divest came from the Mission Responsibility through Investment Committee which determined that the three companies are engaged in non-peaceful pursuits in Israel/Palestine. MRTI has spent a decade monitoring and attempting to engage in dialogue with the companies.

Ben Laney Class of 2018 Another divestment proposal, to stop investing in fossil fuel companies, came to the assembly from 12 presbyteries. While agreeing on the need for action on climate change, the Assembly opted to follow the denomination's established process for investment decisions which refers the overture to the MRTI and requests a recommendation for the GA in 2016.

This year's Assembly voted to reduce the number of synods from the current 16 to between ten and twelve. It was also noted that a process to rewrite the Worship section of the *Book of Order* will begin soon as changes are necessitated by the New Form of Government which became effective in 2011.



Wilson, by A. Scott Berg



I became interested in Wilson's life after visiting his birthplace and early childhood home, the Presbyterian Manse, next to the First Presbyterian Church which his father pastored in Staunton, Virginia.

Thomas Woodrow Wilson was our 28th president, serving two terms from 1913 until 1921, virtually the entirety of World War I.

He was a professor of history, President of Princeton College, and briefly, Governor of New Jersey. While at Princeton, he developed a standard for higher education that changed our education system.

This is a personal and penetrating biography of an influential and enigmatic individual. New information of his personal life came from the recent discovery of letters from his doctor and his middle daughter. It is a readable biography that captures the times, the happiness, and the melancholy of an abundant life which has not been given proper tribute in these times.

Woodrow Wilson was not a politician but a passionate visionary who grasped "the big picture." He blazed the trail for the New Deal and the Progressive administrations that followed him. He had faith in his ideas which were first selfdeliberated and coated with the veneer of history; he could not understand why learned men could not agree with him. The defeat of his League of Nations, an overture for world government, was his bitterest political loss.

As the son and grandson of Presbyterian ministers and a student of theology and ethics himself, one can read "Presbyterian" on the decisions he made throughout his life. As an idealistic figure, his relationships with women were deferred. Once begun, he poured his energy into the relationships; this book interprets the rumors of his affairs. He died at the age of 68, a broken and tragic figure, worn by battle and disappointment in his failures.

A new softback edition of *Wilson*, will be in the library in September.


