

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# A Lenten Journey

"Lent" is one of those words that we struggle with. *Isn't it a Catholic thing?* we wonder. And we feel somehow empowered to stand brave and tall for our Protestant heritage. Well, it's probably time to get on board, because Lent has been celebrated in Protestant circles for centuries now, so that logic no longer holds meaning.

It's a 40-day journey, and it has ties to Jesus' time alone in the desert, and his journey toward Jerusalem and the crucifixion cross. He knew where he was headed. He knew its humiliation. He knew that he would never live to be an old man. He could have spent his time getting his final affairs in order. He could have avoided the cross. He had a choice. Yet within those last 40 days, he continued to serve, to heal, to laugh, to teach, to live his life fully.

Some have heard that they should *give something up for Lent.* Some have heard that they may choose to *add something new for Lent.* Well yes, and isn't that sort of silly? Oh, it's a good practice. It might lead to a good new habit. Jesus was ministering, and praying so hard that he sometimes sweated blood, and we're trying to decide if we should eliminate chocolate from our diets. *Really?* 

Some don't want to engage in a Lenten study, because it's the same old lesson, year after year. We know it ends on Easter morning. Why don't we just go there? It's a happy time, and we'd much rather think of positive things. Well, many do. Did we learn something in a study group last year during Lent? And who's fault might that be?

We might take one word – a Lenten word – and tape it to our mirror, or put it in our pocket, where we could see it each day during Lent. We might focus on that one word and see how it shows up in our life. How one single word takes on meaning during Lent. How just one word changes our opinion about the 40 days. How one single word, considered once a day, might make us more appreciative of what the Messiah did. Or we might not.

We could try to understand and appreciate what Jesus went through. How he centered his mind, not on ordering his worldly needs, but on you. On you. How he surrendered his life, for you. We could take some of our life, and spend it thinking about his. We could.

The choice is yours. It's always been yours. God does not react to us because of what we do or don't do. God initiates. What God intended to do, God has already done. And now God waits. For you.

I hope you make the right choice this year.



#### **DID YOU KNOW?**

About 12 percent of the municipal solid waste stream is plastic materials such as soda bottles, plastic bags, lids, and shampoo bottles. The Henderson Recycling Center at 1203 Highland Drive, (next to Public Services building), accepts some but not all kinds of plastics.

The Henderson Recycling Center accepts No. 1 and No. 2 plastics. The numbers in triangles on the bottom of plastic containers are part of a resin identification coding system that helps distinguish types of plastic. You can use those numbers to determine if our recycling program accepts that type of material. The main markets for recycled plastics are fiber for carpet and textiles and then bottles, depending on the type of plastic. Let's help reduce waste by recycling and reusing!

# **Stewardship Takes a Lifetime**

**No I am not coming to you for more money as it is not budget time**. That time has come and past. However stewardship is not just an October or November occurrence, but is a yearlong lifetime commitment.

A biblical world view of *stewardship* can be consciously *defined* as: "Utilizing and managing all resources God provides for the glory of God and the betterment of His creation."

Stewardship is about recognizing that our life – all of it – is God's. All of life must demonstrate this: "whether you eat, or drink, or whatever you do, do all to the glory of God" (1 Corinthians 10:31). Time, talent, money, dreams, family, Sundays, golf, football, vacations, beach homes – these are a part (perhaps a big part) of our lives. And we must use all these in a manner that bring God glory. We *worship* in *all of life* – presenting our "bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual worship" (Romans. 12:1).

Three times, Paul tells us that he has been entrusted with a "stewardship" (1 Corinthians 9:11; Ephesians 3:2; Colossians 1:25). Similarly, he tells us that he and his fellow apostles are "stewards of the mysteries of God" (1 Corinthians 4:1-2). More generally, Peter adds, "As each has received a gift, use it to serve one another, as good stewards of God's varied grace" (1 Peter 4:10).

**But isn't stewardship about money?** Yes, but that's only a part of it. First, we need to get a perspective – that "we are not our own."

"We are not our own: let not our reason nor our will, therefore, sway our plans and deeds. We are not our own: let us therefore not set it as our goal to seek what is expedient for us according to our flesh. We are not our own: in so far as we can, let us therefore forget ourselves and all that is ours. Conversely, we are God's: let us live for him and die for him. We are God's: let his wisdom and will therefore rule all our actions. We are God's: let all the parts of our life accordingly strive toward him as our only lawful goal." [John Calvin *Institutes of the Christian Religion* (III.7.1)].

#### LENTEN COMMUNION TABLE

Gracing the Communion Table in the sanctuary is a creation by Lsha and Kathy that consists of rocks, jars, twigs, burlap, and purple cloth.

These are simple things decoratively placed. The rocks tumbled in a river and worn smooth by the action of water and gravity. They look dry and dusty but when they are wet, colors appear and they shine. Jesus said that out of stones, God can raise up true people of God.

Rough burlap winds through the pieces; it is a symbol of a rough garment worn long ago by the desert fathers seeking solitude and peace. For Jesus had said "...go, sell your possessions, and give to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven..."

The jars are for storage of food and wine. They are empty. Their rich contents were consumed before this time of repentance and self-sacrifice. They were consumed with bread. Jesus said, "I am the *living* bread that came down from heaven. . . "

There are dry, brittle twigs and broken sticks; there is not a green leaf or flower on them. The psalms say, "As for man, his days are like grass, he flourishes like a flower of the field; the wind blows over it and it is gone. . ."

Beneath all these items is beautiful purple cloth, a color worn by people of importance; people that give us hope: prophets, priests and kings. Christ Jesus gives us hope as he is our Prophet, Priest, and King.

Sunrise Service will begin at 7:00 a.m. at the pavilion in Fair Park. In case of bad weather, we will assemble in the Fellowship Hall. There will be song, story, and prayer. A continental breakfast will follow in Fellowship Hall.
