I've said it before and I'll probably say it again: The more I learn about being a Presbyterian, the prouder I am to be one.




This summer was an exciting one, not to mention "Memorial Day Tornado" in Henderson, Texas, of all places. One week later, on June 6, the Pastor and several Council members attended a Grace Presbytery Meeting at First Presbyterian Church in Tyler, Texas. There we experienced the height of Christian worship with our own Pastor Klein assisting in serving Communion to hundreds of Presbyterians. We listened to church business and voted on important matters, all conducted in the Presbyterian way—"decently and in order"—and enjoyed a hearty picnic lunch under shade trees on grounds of that grand old Presbyterian church.

For me, the highlight of the day was a message from our much-loved Reverend Dr. Janet DeVries during her General Presbyter's report "Reformed and Always Being Reformed" based on John 3:1-12. She brought together the familiar Nicodemus story and a book she was reading by Eric Schmidt, one of the founders of Google. She wove scripture, theology and today's technology into suggestions for innovations in our church ministries.

Dr. DeVries challenged us with the question: "What would happen if we worried less about our failures and more about our lack of risk?" She asked each of us before we left the meeting to think about three people in our own ministry setting to collaborate with about ministry—to begin a steady conversation about what thriving ministry would look like and what we might do to get there. She suggested that "innovation and change in religious order was what Jesus was about, and was what Calvin sought in response to God's spirit blowing through the institutions of his day."

She left us with a rolling slide show of statements from Eric Schmidt's book, such as—"To innovate, you must learn to fail well. Learn from your mistakes." "It helps to see failure as a road and not a wall." "To be a thought




BOOK CORNER

"To Kill a Mockingbird" is a Pulitzer Prize-winning book by Harper Lee. It is written from the viewpoint of Scout, a young girl about to enter the first grade as the book begins. She is the daughter of a town lawyer, Atticus Finch, who is widowed. Scout has an older brother, Jem, and the family has a Negro maid, Calpurnia, who cooks, tends house, and tries to keep Jem and Scout out of mischief.

The setting is a sleepy southern Alabama town in the mid-1930s. The book introduces kindly characters, some quite eccentric, who would be familiar to anyone who remembers Rusk County in the 1950s. People go to church, visit with each other in homes, and speak politely to one another, even if their politeness masks their real opinions. As the author states, people moved slowly then. All is well, except, of course, for the problem of extreme racial prejudice toward Negroes.

When a Negro man is falsely accused of sexual assault against a white woman, Atticus agrees to defend him. This, of course, provokes a crisis of conscience for the community and leads to lots of lessons in life for Scout and Jem. Scout finds that the attitudes that the community has toward blacks stand in stark contrast to how she feels about Calpurnia. Readers move to the roots of human behavior—to innocence and experience, kindness and cruelty, love and hatred, humor and pathos.

The most surprising thing about the book to me was its humor. On page after page, I found myself chuckling at an apt observation by the author. Harper Lee is a keen observer of the human condition. Her book is an easy read. I recommend it to anyone who is a student of human nature.

2015 CHURCH OFFICER NOMINATING COMMITTEE

The work of the 2015 Church Officer Nominating Committee has begun. Members are: Mary Lowe, Kathy Porter, and Carol Scoggins from the congregation; Tom Laney and Bert Lowe from the session. The purpose of this group is to nominate a "class" of church officers whose two year term will begin in January, 2016 and conclude in January, 2018. These officers are referred to as the Class of 2018; a class of officers ends their term every year. A church officer must be a ruling elder or be eligible to be ordained a ruling elder. Those nominated will be elected in a congregational meeting in late fall; nominations from the floor are accepted if the person being nominated has given prior approval. After election, the officers elect will experience training, study, and examination by the session and be installed in January, 2016. This committee, known as "CONC" met on July 22nd and has scheduled a meeting on August 12.

Another duty of CONC is to nominate three individuals from the congregation to serve on this committee in the year 2016. The session will elect two members and the congregation, three. The nominees will be presented for election by the congregation in January. Again, nominations may be received from the floor.






