# The Season of Advent



We wait and we wait; that's what much of Advent is all about. The Hebrew people waited centuries. And when the waiting was over, the end result looked nothing like what they had anticipated. The Holy Child did not come in a palace. (should they wait for another?) There was no trumpet fanfare to announce his birth. (who knew this had happened?) As he grew up, he confused the church leaders. (he's just a kid, what could he *know?*) As he gave instruction to his students, he spoke in parables – that often sounded like riddles to them. (what do you suppose that means?) As he described his coming walk to Golgatha, they tried to talk him out of it. (no, no Rabbi. Not you!) As he hung on the cross as a convicted felon, they mocked him and challenged him to prove his identity (if he's the son of God, let him save himself.) And those closest to him, refused to remain with him at the end. ("Forgive them, Father.")

We know the story. We know the many details. We know how it turns out. We know that evil, and sin, and death won't win. But that does not allow us to ignore the waiting that is a part of Advent. Because too many people don't know the story. They haven't heard how it turns out. And if they have, they aren't certain what it means, or how it relates to them. And that's where you come in.

It is our calling to tell the Christ Child's story. To anyone and to everyone. It takes time to tell it. It takes patience to recall the details. It takes wisdom to know when the listener is ready. And, if we don't tell the story, then we can't be surprised when the story doesn't spread.

Take time this Advent season, and tell the story. You may not do it perfectly - but please try. You may not do it successfully - but God will recognize your efforts. You may not do it often enough, to large crowds of family or neighbors. But tell it. The Season of Advent leads to one of the most glorious times of the year. And, as you lean in to tell the story, someone will want to hear more... and more... and you will spread the good news!

Now, wouldn't that make your Christmas, and theirs spectacular!

#### **RENOVATION PROGRESS**

The Building Commission hopes you were in church Sunday; the new lighting was on full force. The carpenters & electricians worked together to build a false ceiling to house the new lighting on Thursday & Friday. The carpenters & electricians worked late Friday & Saturday (11/21/15) evening to get the new lighting working. The electricians were not able to get the system completely programed in order that we can use the dimming functions. That work shall be completed soon. We hope you were pleased with their work. Next Sunday (11/29/15) we will definitely need all the lighting because the windows will be covered temporarily boarded up as a result of the removal of the center brick column & the existing windows. This step is being done in order that the new windows can begin to be installed beginning 11/29/15. Your Building Commission has decided to have stucco applied to all the walls. We do not have an exact date for that work at this point but plan for that to commence soon as possible after the windows are installed. There are plans to freshen up the ceiling & beams as a part of this renovation work. We hope you are happy with the work & I want you to know that 3 families in our congregation donated \$80,000 for this work. There have been no funds from any other source. The Commission has worked very hard to use these funds to be approved by God, the donors, and this congregation. As the chair, I thank you for your support. If you would want to

#### **WORSHIP COMMITTEE NEWS**

I was dazzled by the brilliance of the new lighting in the sanctuary on Sunday November 22nd. Seeing the lights first shine on Saturday was not as dramatic as when the congregation, pastor, organist, and liturgist were in their places. The light enhanced our voices and the majesty of the organ music. Window installation is next, and that will provide even more light. John Tieken expressed it accurately, "We are not just renovating our building we are rebuilding our congregation." Sanctuary remodeling will take priority over decorating the sanctuary and narthex for Advent, at least in the first part of December. The Advent Wreath will be in its place on Sunday, November 29, and we will light the first purple candle, the "Prophecy Candle," in memory of the prophets, primarily Isaiah, who foretold the birth of Christ. Twelve new Chrismons (Monograms of Christ) are in production for the sanctuary Chrismons trees. The Christmas Eve Service will be a traditional format beginning at 5:30 p.m. The public will be invited by a newspaper advertisement. The Martin Luther King, Jr. Memorial Service will be held in our sanctuary on January 16, 2016. It will be planned by the Pastor, members of the Worship Committee, and Ms. Betty Elder. Our representatives will aid in planning the program and still allow the traditional features of the celebration to continue as in the past.

#### WHAT SEASON IS NEXT AT FPC HENDERSON?

"To everything there is a season, and a time to every purpose under the heaven: A time to be born, and a time to die; a time to plant, and a time to pluck up that which is planted; A time to kill, and a time to heal; a time to break down, and a time to build up; A time to weep, and a time to laugh; a time to mourn, and a time to dance". –Ecclesiastes 3:1-4

Wise king Solomon points out in Ecclesiastes how everything in life seems to happen in cycles; being born, dying; planting, harvesting; laughing, crying. Our life is framed by the circle of time; day in – day out, eating, sleeping, working. The sun goes up, the sun goes down. The weeks, months and years pass by. Solomon sums this up by observing that "to everything there is a <u>season</u>". The recurrence in seasons and cycles is how we experience so much of our reality. The spring season is sweet because we're coming out of bleakness of winter. The season brings with it a whole association of thoughts and feelings that we've compiled over the span of our lifetimes. This is what makes cycles and seasons so powerful in our human experience.

I submit that Seasons and Cycles are extremely important to the Life of the Church's Worship. They are spiritually formative. Year after year, they leave a deepening and lasting impression upon our spirits. It's is now that we find ourselves in the Advent/Christmas season cycle.

In the first, Advent signals longing. We human beings have deep expectations and hopes. The Christmas celebration is God's answer to our expectations. God is with us in the person of our Savior Jesus. Also in this time we find ourselves in the Stewardship season.

In thousands of congregations the brilliant colors of fall signal the season for annual budgets, stewardship sermons and pledge cards. For many churches it's the only time of year financial stewardship is given high visibility. In the best-case scenario, the members pledge enough to meet the church budget, and the congregation is on its way to another year of ministry. Except for budget reports, talk about money is mostly set aside until the following autumn.

However, a growing number of congregations regard financial giving as an important

part of Christian discipleship that deserves year-round emphasis. I hope we can be one of those Presbyterian congregations by keeping stewardship forefront in our minds and in our church during all seasons of our worship. We have great needs and plans that need our support if we are to be successful through the year. I hope you keep these things in mind as you decide how strong your stewardship will be this year. We are counting on you!

#### **DID YOU KNOW?**

Did you know that with a little effort and imagination we can reduce the environmental impact of the Christmas season? We have a few ideas to help celebrate Christmas while caring for God's creation. To start out, try to simplify, do less this year. Even if all you do is skip one party, buy one less present, or do less decorating. Let that be your gift to yourself. Conserve energy by cleaning or replacing your filters as recommended in order for efficient heating. Conserve energy by using LED holiday lights which are at least 75% more efficient, are cooler, and last 25 times longer than traditional incandescent lights; also use a timer for efficient usage of lights. Save on fuel consumption by shopping locally. If you can't find what you want here, shop online in the comfort of your home. If you should shop Amazon. Com, how about going to <a href="www.smile.amazon.com">www.smile.amazon.com</a> and choose First Presbyterian Henderson, TX as your charity and FPC will receive a .5% donation.

When it comes to gift giving, what about giving someone an experience present—tickets to a play or concert, movie tickets, restaurants. No packaging! And for the person who doesn't need more "stuff", donate to a charity in their honor. A really green gift would be to plant trees in someone's honor. If you must give a gift with batteries, how about getting rechargeable ones with a charger. Remember you can dispose of your old batteries by bringing to the church office. If you get new electronics, remember to dispose of old ones at a periodic Trash Off Day sponsored by the city and Keep Henderson Beautiful rather than the landfill. Use real dishes but if the numbers necessitate, use paper disposable items that will break down in landfills. Reuse or recycle all that Christmas packaging and wrapping. Don't forget God's feathered creatures by placing pine cones slathered in peanut butter and rolled in seeds outside your

windows and enjoy the scene.


