The Christian Education “Green Team” wants to remind folks about curbside recycling that started in January. The city of Henderson cares about “the environmental footprint of the city,” and the certified Earth Care Congregation does, too!

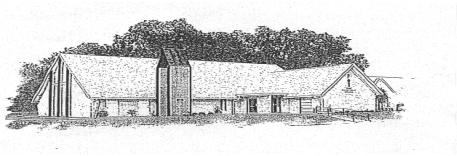
Here are some points to know:

If you have curbside trash pickup by the city, you will also have curbside recycling at no additional cost. But you must call 1-800-877-1777 to request the free recycle bin, to subscribe to the service, or to request more information.

The orange lid recycle bin will be delivered to your residence. The lid indicates what can be recycled: paper, cardboard, clean plastics (#1 or #2 on the bottom) as well as clean aluminum and metal cans. Glass will not be included. All recyclables can be commingled in the bin, so it is not necessary to separate items.

The Recycling Center at the Public Services Warehouse at 1203 Highland Drive is still open for residents not in the city limits.

TEXAS “OPEN CARRY” LAW

Once again, I find myself intrigued with the things I did *not* learn in seminary. I took Church History classes, Bible classes, Old Testament Exegesis, New Testament Exegesis, Family Systems theory, Christian Ethics, Christian Education, Hebrew, Greek, Trinitarian Theology, Presbyterian Polity, Preaching, Pastoral Care, Pastoral Counseling, Clinical Pastoral Education, Mission and Evangelism, and the list goes on. But nothing – truly *nothing* about guns in church. Who knew I'd need that!

But, here it is.

I read an article taken from an Austin NBC affiliate (KXAN) that indicates, although the Governor has signed the law, many people don't yet understand it. And, the nine hundred thousand who currently carry concealed hand gun licenses, and were grandfathered in to the new law, have not and will not receive any information to clarify their licenses.

It appears that additional areas also need explanation. Questions surround when guns are permitted on school grounds, mental healthcare facilities, banks, churches, businesses that serve alcohol, and even courts.

Yes, your Session has also struggled. And I want you to know what they decided. As a body, as the *serving body* here in this congregation, Session members decided that we do not want guns visible on the church property. We understand that some of our members have licenses, and that they have been trained, but because we have older adults here and sometimes small children, we don't want guns that are visible – even when they're appropriately holstered. We also have chosen not to add gun law signage to our doors.

Therefore..... we have decided that if a person comes into the church building with a gun visible, that person will be asked to leave. They have the choice to leave and not return, or to leave and return *without* the gun. If that person refuses to leave when requested, they will be violating laws of trespass.

Please allow me to apologize to you for not writing a Pipeline article that has more spiritual content than this article does. I think it's still an article that offers information – *church information*. And I think if we all agree to follow the plan that your leaders adopted, then at least we will all be in agreement about behavior at church.

And if I decide to return to seminary for more course work, I'll insist on some classes that pertain to operating a church in Texas. Apparently, that's important.

Happy New Year!! First I would just like to thank everyone for supporting me through my YAV year through prayer, love and financial assistance. My roommates and I are benefitting from your gratitude more than you know. Donations go towards our living expenses, stipend and keeping the YAV Program thriving.

Although it's been stressful and difficult I couldn't have asked for a better support team to help carry me through the year. As many of you know my year is focused on Food Justice and my work is split between The Presbyterian Church of Burlington and the Burlington Food Pantry. So far my responsibilities at the pantry are weighing incoming and outgoing food, organization, interacting with the clients and collaborating with the board to help the pantry run more efficiently. In addition I have started a book discussion, a bi-weekly minute for mission based on Pope Francis's encyclical on the environment, and am leading a panel discussion and movie nights. All of this is in order to promote and teach healthy, and local eating using food education outlets.

Outside of work we are practicing what we preach by eating a diet of locally grown food that we have stored by canning and freezing and living as simply as possible. That means saving energy by unplugging, switching off and bundling up. On Fridays we have community day revolved around a book and devotion. I've learned a lot about what it means to call myself a Presbyterian and am looking forward to see what God has in store for me next. This program is transforming young adults in a positive way and pushing us out of our comfort zone to embrace our future as Christians.

**BOOK REVIEW**

**The Lemon Tree by Sandy Tolan**

This book was donated to the church library by Shirley Latham, a former member of First Presbyterian Church, Henderson and current organist of First Presbyterian Church, Richardson (and a member of the illustrious Henderson High School Class of 1964, as is yours truly and many other remarkably brilliant people), in honor of her mother.

This is an excellent book for anyone who is interested in gaining some understanding of issues in the Middle East. It is about two families. One is Jewish, the Eshkenazis, who escaped the Holocaust in Bulgaria and came to Israel in 1948. The other family is the Khairis, an Arab family who owned a house in Ramla in Palestine.

As a result of the Arab/Jewish War of 1948, Arab families of Ramla were forcibly removed from their homes and sent to Ramallah in the West Bank. The Khairi family had to unwillingly leave the home which the father had built in 1936. He had planted a lemon tree in the backyard and it was a favorite tree of the entire family.

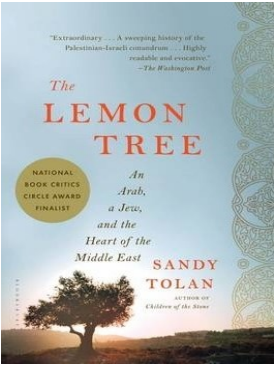
Subsequently, the Eshkenazi family, who had narrowly escaped being deported by the Nazis to extermination camps during World War Two, was moved into the home in Ramla formerly occupied by the Khairis. They were told that the former occupants had just left of their own free will.

Bashir Khairi, the young son of the Khairis, grew up in the West Bank, but always wanted to see the home he left when he was six years old. He went there in 1967, rang the doorbell, and met Dalia Eshkenazi, daughter of the Jewish family which had moved there when she was an infant. The remainder of the book concerns conversations and views held by Bashir and Dalia, as they realized that both of them in a sense had the same home and neither of them had another real home. But, they both could not occupy it at the same time. Bashir and Dalia never gave up their views as Arabs and Jews, respectively, but they were respectful of one another's differing views (unlike so many not only in the Middle East, but also here in the United States).

This book makes it very clear that there are two sides and two views in the current Middle East. One side is not clearly right and the other clearly wrong; it is much more complicated than that. There is right and wrong on each side. Anyone wanting a simple black and white view of the Middle East will not find it here.

I strongly recommend this book. It was very interesting to read.

Park Project board and Elder have been planning the service for many years and local churches take turns hosting each year. First Presbyterian first hosted in 2013 and this will be its second year to do so.

"We sat with Betty and I have a committee and we talked about the worship components, who would take part and who we would ask to take part, so we've got several different people from several churches to take part," said the Rev. Candice Klein, pastor of First Presbyterian.

Elder will welcome guests to begin the program. Attendees will sing the national anthem together and say the Pledge of Allegiance.

The choir from Mother Zion Baptist Church will sing as well as several individuals with solos, including Bert Lowe who will sing "Take My Hand, Precious Lord," which was King's

favorite song, and Dan Hogan.

This year's guest speaker is the Rev. Dr. John Cunyus, pastor of Henderson's First Christian Church.

"Dr. Cunyus will read and do some explaining and commentary of 'I Have a Dream' and read some excerpts from it," Elder said.

There will also be a love offering taken and everything given will go towards funding all the projects within Help the Youth of Yates Park.

A political forum will be held, and Mayor Pat Brack will speak briefly and all elected officials and candidates are welcome.

"The reason we do the political thing is because of Dr. King's emphasis on the civil rights movement and his dreams," Elder said. "It brought about the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the Voting Rights Act of 1965 and school integration. Now people can go to school together, go to church together,

worship together and we live in peace and harmony together."

After the service a brief reception will be held in First Presbyterian's fellowship hall, because Klein said "it's all about coming together."

"I think that in this 21st century, and certainly in the year 2016, our country and people in our country are struggling still, unfortunately, with race relations," Klein said. "We see in the news what's happening across the country. A lot of it is horrifying to watch and some of it is great to watch. Here in Henderson, I think it's important to be aware of what's going on around us and that we don't turn into a statistic."

"This is our community and all of us have to be a part of it and to say someone is unqualified because of the color of their skin or because of the way that they worship, we're past that. Or we should be past that."

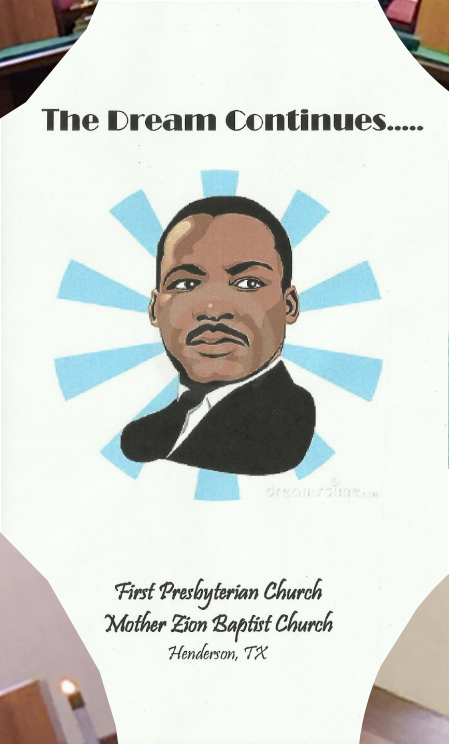
