COURAGE

I once heard a quote from the late actor John Wayne. When asked what real courage was, he replied, *"Courage is being scared to death – but saddling up anyway."* Many people think that a courageous person has no fear, but that's not so. Courageous people have fear, but they go in anyway. They have fear, but they don't stop. They have fear, but they press on.

As we look at our news reports and learn about this dangerous world we live in, I want you to know that the Presbyterian denomination will be asking you to show courage. I realize it won't be easy. I know it won't be what you want. But as we look at our world, we must understand that church is not only a place where we can come to *feel good* – about where we are, about what we do, or even about how we do good stuff. It's also a place of sanctuary. As a denomination, and also as a Henderson church within the Presbyterian denomination, we must be known as a place for healing, peace, and reconciliation in a culture of violence.

Your Session members have voted to financially support a Presbyterian partner, trained to help those who have experienced violence – particularly gender-based violence, sexual violence, or gun violence. You think it doesn't happen here in East Texas? I'm sorry, it does. You think it doesn't happen here in Henderson? I'm sorry, it does. You think it doesn't happen here at FPC? Yep. Having professional help available, through the work and the gifts of this church, allows survivors to realize that God cares, that they are not alone, and that the church is a safe place to seek help.

So, look around you – but look with both eyes wide open. This isn't a magical place. It's a place where evil resides. It's a place where safety isn't guaranteed. It's a place where folks you see, and folks you know are in trouble – just like in the newspapers. And we've decided that we won't condone silence about it any longer.

Thank you for being a part of a church and a denomination that intends to leave this world a better place than we found it.

Have you taken an opportunity to look around in the corners and at the surfaces of our church building? If you have, you will notice that everything is in sharper focus. This is the result of detailing; it's not just for autos. We have some great detailers in this congregation, and they put their heart into the work getting ready for the sanctuary dedication. Jan Pennal did floors and baseboards in the entryways and chancel; Jan Mims and Lynn did re-staining on doors and framings; Kathy and Pat rearranged and organized the library; Pat, Kathy, and Tom prepared the glass showcases to display some of our church's art and history in the History Room. In the balcony, John Tieken bundled loose wiring and routed organ speaker wires so that now the balcony floor is clear. Bob refinished the laminated flooring, kept the messes cleaned up, and donated a state-of-the art vacuum cleaner. The B&G Committee is grateful for the assist with these details.

There are still some projects left for 2016. For example: clear the surface drain behind the building; repair wood railings outside kitchen door; clean

up brush behind building; clean the inside/clean outside of south-facing windows and repaint; install security cameras at front and middle entrances.

It just feels right to get our church building cleaned up and organized after so much remodeling. Thanks to all that helped and to those who will continue to keep the building looking its best.



CHRISTIAN EDUCATION (CE) HAPPENINGS



Jimmy Chapman and Rev. Gordon Blackman will tell us about what they learned during their three days in Jerusalem, three days at Tiberius on the Sea of Galilee, and six days in Bethlehem. Their Palestinian Christian guide, Ibrahim, told them that they would never read the Bible the same after they had seen some of the sites of the Holy Land. Jimmy said that is definitely true. 

LET'S TALK HISTORY!

What do Richard Brown's copy of *History of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church*, the Polyglott Bible from 1869, and Jane Fahle's picture books have in common? They are all in our "**History Room**"! Yes, our History Room – the latest project of the Christian Education Committee.

Everyone has 'history' and our church certainly does – as one of the eight oldest Presbyterian churches in Texas. Each year on Presbyterian Heritage Sunday, there have been displays in the narthex. The items are then put away for another year. But now, most of these are at home in the area assessing the balcony, at one time, the music director's office.

There are key people who have been instrumental in keeping our history documented and preserved. Alicia Rich did research for a narrative of the 150 year history of our church for the Sesquicentennial Celebration in 1995. And she located pictures of former buildings dating from the 1800's to the present era.

Jane Fahle faithfully took pictures of church functions starting in the late 1970's. These are in photo albums and also in scrapbooks with newspaper articles of church member's activities. Jane's latest contribution is a collection of member's obituaries and bulletins from their services. She is open to adding others to the collection that she doesn't already have.

Tom and Pat Laney have sifted through old files and boxes and found more historical items which can now be placed in the history room. Some in the display cases are not accessible due to the logistics of the room, so items will be rotated. Identifying and labeling is yet to be done, but it is exciting that the project is beginning. Stop by and learn some history of First Presbyterian Church.
