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WAITING FOR EASTER

During the past month, we have been on the 40 day journey that leads to Easter. In observing the 40 days of Lent, Christians are reminded of Jesus' 40 days in the wilderness of fasting and praying. In the wilderness time, Jesus found his identity which allowed him to resist the temptations that were put before him. He came out of the wilderness to begin his ministry confident in who he was and what was his relationship to God.

What does this 40 days of testing story say to us today? Most of us at some time or another have experienced some kind of wilderness. Lent is a time of thinking about hard questions, like who we are and who we want to be. It may be uncomfortable but will be a good thing if it makes us more open to God.

During this time of Lent, we at FPC find ourselves in a type of wilderness. We are in a time of discernment of who we are and who we want to be. We are in a time of waiting to see where God leads us. But waiting is difficult. It may be one of the most difficult aspects of the Christian life. We are impatient to wait to see what God is about to do. Waiting does not mean doing nothing. Our waiting includes our work of kingdom building by continuing to do God's work here at FPC.

David in the Psalms tells us how to wait. Wait patiently—He tells us in Psalm 37 to be still and to wait patiently for God to act. Wait expectantly—He tells us in Psalm 105 to wait expectantly, trusting God to help by remembering all that he has done.. Waiting means that we give God the benefit of the doubt that he knows what he is doing. Waiting is God's way of seeing if we will trust Him before we move forward. While we wait, let us look for signs of God's love and grace in the world and continue to share the Good News.

As we approach Easter—a renewal, a Resurrection, let us remember our time is not God's time. It may seem like Friday, but remember Sunday is a'coming! Remember we do not wait alone for Jesus is already here. Thanks be to God.



As God offers all people the special gift of peace through Jesus Christ, and through Christ reconciles all to God, we are called to deal justly with one another and the earth.

- 1. Our worship and discipleship will celebrate God's grace and glory in creation and declare that God calls us to cherish, protect and restore the earth.
- 2. In education, we will seek learning and teaching opportunities to know and understand the threats to God's creation and the damage already inflicted. We will encourage and support each other in finding ways of keeping and healing the creation in response to God's call to earth-keeping, justice and community.
- 3. Our facilities will be managed, maintained and upgraded in a manner that respect and cherishes all creation, human and non-human, while meeting equitably the needs of all people. In our buildings and on our grounds we will use energy efficiently, conserve resources, and share what we have in abundance so that God's holy creation will be sustainable for all life and future generations.

4. Our outreach will encourage public policy and community involvement that protect and restores the vulnerable and degraded earth as well as oppressed and neglected people. We will be mindful that our personal and

collective actions can positively or negatively affect our neighborhood, region, nation, and world. We will seek to achieve environmental justice through coalitions and ecumenical partnerships.

Your session re-affirmed this pledge in January of this year in order to be re-certified as an Earth Care Congregation. May it be so.
