THE PRESBYTERIAN PIPELINE

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In this Season of Thanksgiving

I will praise the name of God with a song; I will magnify Him with thanksgiving.

Psalm 86:12

In several weeks, the week of Thanksgiving will be here. Sometimes in our present-day culture, Thanksgiving is way more about receiving than giving. During Thanksgiving week, we receive a couple of days of vacation, days of football, excessive amounts of food. These days are not intended as a launching pad to our pre-Christmas shopping. It's not about fall or an American obsession of turkey and cranberry jelly.

Thanksgiving is about gratitude. Thanksgiving is about recognizing the presence of God in everyday life. Thanksgiving is about stopping to kneel before the Source of all that is good, to express our gratitude. Thanksgiving is gratitude in action. It is about turning our eyes from our gifts (blessings) to rest upon the goodness of the Giver. Thanksgiving is an act which connects us to the eternal God and as such, it anchors us to something that will last forever.

This is what that small, bedraggled band of Puritans understood on the first American Thanksgiving nearly 400 years ago. They were no strangers to sorrow. Persecuted for their faith and having to leave their native country, they had survived a terrible sea voyage only to arrive in New England just in time for a brutal winter. More than half of the original Pilgrims died during that first winter. The next fall, Edward Winslow described the celebration now known as the first Thanksgiving "...for three days we entertained and feasted...And although it be not always so plentiful as it was at this time with us, yet by the goodness of God, we are so far from want."

Let's start *Thanks-living* today, let's not wait until Thanksgiving Day. Let's recognize the gifts we have been given each day from coffee in the morning until rest in a comfortable bed at night and with a thankful heart glorify God through loving expressions to others. And when Thanksgiving Day arrives we will give thanks for the blessings we all have—living in a country where freedom is guaranteed and schooling is a given, not a dream, where we can move from place to place without being arrested, and where we have so much more than can only be imagined by millions of others. When we give thanks for home and family, we will remember the greatest gift of all which we can never lose: God, God's love through the gift of Jesus Christ! Thanks be to God.


DID YOU KNOW?

Did you know that Georgetown, Texas, an "exurb" of Austin, is one of the first cities in the country to be 100 percent powered by renewable energy? When the old power contract was up in 2012, the city managers sat down to look at their options. They realized that wind and solar power are more predictable. The prices don't swing up and down like oil and gas. The city signed a contract and knows what the bill is going to be for the next 25 years. That is especially appealing in a place like Georgetown where a lot of retirees live on fixed incomes. The decision to go with renewables was both a business decision as well as an environmental decision. The mayor of Georgetown says the decision was because of their love of green—green rectangles (money) and green energy. Renewable energy is becoming cheaper because of renewable technology; 90 percent of the cost associated with it is the initial capital investment because you don't pay for the fuel. The power generated from the sun and wind is essentially free. In a few years, solar is set to become the cheapest power source on earth. (CBS **News-Money Watch 7-27-17)**



HURRICANE HARVEY/BEAUMONT AREA

I was invited by a PDA friend of mine to join a work team she was leading to Beaumont Texas last week. She pastors two churches: one in Sacramento, CA. and one in Truckee, CA., (1 & 1/2 hours' drive apart). She has more energy and passion than two normal people. In total, there were 17 persons including me. We bunked and had our evening and breakfast meals at St. Andrews Presbyterian in Beaumont. We also made our own individual sandwiches in the mornings before departing for work. There was a couple (members there) who knew Jane Fahle very well. We did "mucking out" work in 5 different homes in the Beaumont, Vidor, Rose City, & Sour Lake Mucking out is removing all floor covering, sheet rock, and insulation from the walls. We also did ministry of presence (listening to their stories) which is so important for the survivor's journey back to a "new normal". The mandatory evacuation order came too late and many people had to be evacuated by boat. One couple where we worked said they were evacuated by boat from their second story window. I saw very few neighborhoods that did not have debris piled up at the curb, including refrigerators, washers, driers, etc. The flooding did not spare nice neighborhoods or poor neighborhoods. I share this story with you emphasize that the people of this area desperately need help now and months and even years to come, to recover their lives. Please volunteer to help by going on a work trip, or contribute to PDA, American Red Cross, or another reputable agency of your choice. Pray for these individuals. Another way I suggest is to provide scholarships for people who are physically able to go on a mission trip. The team I worked with paid \$400 each. This money paid for their food, lodging at the church, rental of two vans, etc. They also paid for their own individual transportation costs, to and from. If you have ever entertained the idea of volunteering for a trip like this, I encourage you to go for it. You will return home very tired but fulfilled. I repeat myself saying God's work is not necessarily done efficiently in our eyes, but I am convinced He is pleased with the efforts and the outcome.
