Why Heaven Can't Be "Up There"

We often refer to heaven as a place that is somewhere else. We think of it in terms of way up there beyond the stars, or after we die, or in the end. But if God lives in heaven and heaven is somewhere else, how can God dwell in us? "... if we love one another, God lives in us, and his love is perfected in us. By this we know that we abide in him and he in us, because he has given us of his Spirit". Perhaps it is the limits of language trying to pin God down in space and time when we more accurately profess over and again that God is the Alpha and Omega, the One who is and was and is to come, and One who is the beginning and the end.

When heaven is out of reach or somewhere in our imagination, then heaven can be used by the people who have "high socioeconomic positions" as a story to tell "those [who are] barely making it in life and who desperately need to believe in alternative reality."

John of Patmos describes Jesus "coming with the clouds" which feels like an up in the sky placement. But this upward placement is within sight, like a kingdom on a hill. From this vantage point, "every eye will see him, even those who pierced him." If EVERY eye is able to see him, then Christ is known to everyone. John's apocalypse becomes a revelation of Christ's unveiling for all. Perhaps when we are all confronted with the unquestionable presence of God, the vastly different ways each of us manifest God's image in ourselves won't seem so strange after all.

If heaven isn't a place, but an interconnected communal response of joy to the presence of God, why can't we participate in heaven today?

Leaving heaven in the somewhere, someday realm means that what we do today to each other, or neglect to do for each other, or our environment, or out of respect for neighbors we might never meet, has little consequence in our lives.

If heaven is only somewhere out there, yet to come, then what happens on earth doesn't matter.

But we know it does. We know it matters because God IS with us. Our Redeemer is present overwhelmingly in the life of Jesus Christ. God is with us throughout the Hebrew Scriptures: in pillars of smoke, burning bushes, protecting children and individuals in the wilderness, calming storms, and parting seas. From the beginning to the winds of Pentecost, the Holy One is with us in the breath of life that is the gift of the Spirit within us.

Heaven is not over there for just a few who can make it in the end. It is for us to share right now in praise of the One who is.

The inevitable became evitable! We had to begin a "facelift" for the church – and we needed to begin with the 22 year old roof. The good news is we have a beautiful, more efficient and structurally sound new roof. The not as good news is that the insurance for the storm damage only covered a portion of the re-roofing. As with most stories, the silver lining is that with some money we had set aside for roofing, the insurance payment and some other not specifically designated funds, we are looking to raise at least another \$15,000 to pay for the new roof.

To that end, the Session has given the Building & Grounds Committee permission and authority to begin a capital campaign to help raise funds for our new roof and for other "under the roof" maintenance improvements that are needed. This is our invitation to each of you to be part of the *Raising the Roof and What's Under the Roof Campaign*. These funds will be used first to help pay for the new roof and then will be used toward additional capital improvement projects for the betterment of our church.
