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Breaking Through

I recently traveled for continuing education to the ecumenical Festival of Homiletics preaching conference. The theme this year was "Moral Imagination."

One enjoyable lecture was offered by Brian McLaren. We gathered in the beautiful sanctuary of Westminster Presbyterian Church in Minneapolis, with its gorgeous wrap around balcony and elegant domed ceiling. Brian reminded us that one of the responsibilities of preaching is to help the listener break through the "domes" of popular thinking by using our imaginations. In this way, preaching can resemble science fiction.

Think about it: Jesus is always breaking down barriers. He gives unexpected answers, flips established thinking on its head, and turns up in unexpected places.

Without meaning to, we trap ourselves under real and figurative domes of contentment. Breaking through the dome of our expectations and shattering the restrictive force-field that inhibits our imaginations is what the inbreaking of the kin-dom of God is all about.

In the comedy/fantasy movie *The Truman Show*, the main character has spent his entire life inside a controlled, made for TV dome. Everybody he knows is an actor. Everything he does is aired on television; every product he uses is branded to be sold as commercial sponsorship. The difficulty of breaking through the dome of our perception and imagination is summed up poignantly by one of the characters, Upton Sinclair: it is "difficult to get a man to understand something when his salary depends upon his not understanding."

It is tempting to be satisfied with the way things are. As Christians who believe in the kin-dom of God and the promise of the resurrection, we have to summon the courage and imagination to look beyond our own success and strive for fairness and well-being for all humanity and creation.

Sometimes it takes a wakeup call in our lives to understand just how much God is present with us in this mission. In outer space, it's that moment when artificial gravity is turned off however briefly and everything floats into surreal disarray only to be slammed back down a moment later when the ship's systems are finished rebooting. Everything is rearranged, some things are broken, and the environment looks shockingly different even though it is remarkably the same.

It can take that sort of recalibration to jump start our imaginations and open our eyes and hearts to potential and possibility where we previously saw none.

From another perspective, "Moral Imagination" is the insight to look past the characters in the story of the Good Samaritan and get to the root of the problem: the ROAD.

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Have we ever considered the ROAD? Traci Blackmon believes the Good Samaritan and the Innkeep are just the beginning of the Christian response. The Jericho road is a dangerous place. Consider the options: people who can afford it hire protection. Those who have the luxury of time find an alternate route. The road is the place where more will be robbed and wounded if things do not change. With courageous moral imagination, we ask: why is the road unsafe? Why are there people on the Jericho road who are so desperate that they are driven to haunt this road like bandits?

We investigate and create solutions for the root problems. Is there a lack of jobs? Is there a shortage of food or affordable housing? Is there education and opportunity? Unearth the oppression at the source and fix the broken systems that keep people down. Work to mend these systemic failures, and the road will become a safer place to travel for everyone.

We have gifts of creativity and imagination and we have a moral obligation to put these gifts to work for the glory of our Creator.

With joy, let us break through together.


A Message from Building & Grounds – We're Raisin' for the Roof!

The FPC Building & Grounds Committee is leading the Capital Campaign to help raise funds for the new roof. We need your help. As you know, our previous roof was over 20 years old – had storm damage and significant wear and tear that had occurred over the years. When the inspector came, you could see through the shingles! So that roof had done its duty. Through this process, we also learned that there was no insulation to speak of between the roof and the inside of the sanctuary – this contributed greatly to our high utility bills.

With storm damage and age, the entire roof had to be replaced. As we have shared, the insurance covered damages from the most recent storm only to the side of the roof facing Fair Park. The Session, as good stewards not only of the

finances of the church but also good stewards of keeping the structural integrity of our church, approved a full roof replacement.

Our goal amount to raise to help pay for the new roof is \$15,000. And as this church always does, we know that if everyone gives some much can be done. We know that each of you already financially and spiritually support the workings of this church — and for that we are all grateful.
