We are the church. We are God's people. Even as we practice responsible social distancing, we continue to discern new ways of connecting. Our priority as followers of Christ remains: love God and love our neighbors as we love ourselves.

In response to the COVID-19 outbreak, First Presbyterian Church of Henderson has chosen to follow Grace Presbytery's recommendation from March 16 and meet virtually until it is deemed safer to do so by authorities.

We formed a Task Force to work with Session, monitor the developing situation, and determine our course of action.

Know that you can call on Rev Michele, the members of the Task Force, Jimmy Chapman, Kathy Porter, Kelly Weaver, John and Lynn Tieken, or your Session if there is any way at all we can support you during this time.

We are excited to explore this opportunity to worship virtually! So that we may continue to worship our Creator together, a service of Word and Prayer will be streamed live on Sunday mornings at 11am on FPC's Facebook page. If you prefer, and by request, the office will happily mail to you a packet containing the Sunday service and bulletin, a written copy of the Pastor's homily, and the midweek meditation.

The church will keep in touch through the phone tree, Shepherd phone calls, email and traditional mail. Rev Michele will keep her Monday and Wednesday office hours from 9:30 to 12:30. (As long as Michele is well.) And of course, you are encouraged to call, text and email one another!

As a gentle reminder, please remember to mail in your pledges. While the sanctuary is dark, your church staff is still working to keep us connected for the glory of God and God's mission in the world.

TIPS for preventing the spread of COVID-19, from the Center for Disease Control:

Wash your hands thoroughly with soap. Use hand sanitizer that is at least 60% alcohol. Avoid touching your face. Put distance between yourself and others and avoid close contact with others. Stay home if you are sick. Cover coughs and sneezes with a tissue, or the inside of your elbow. Clean and disinfect frequently touched surfaces.

Statewide, Texas is under a declared public health disaster. This comes with the advice to adhere to the practices listed above in addition to limiting gatherings of more than 10 people.

These measures to socially distance ourselves and observe preventative cautions will hopefully help to flatten the curve, slowing the spread of the virus, and ensuring that more Americans will receive the healthcare attention they need. Even if you are not at risk, your precautions will help protect others who are.

Our Christian mission hold us fast through the uncertainty: love God and love our neighbors as we love ourselves.

DID YOU KNOW?

Did you know that on April 22, 2020 the 50th Anniversary of Earth Day will be celebrated?

The history of Earth Day began during a time when the U.S. was experiencing both political and economic ups and downs. During the 60's the economy was on the move, but it was costing the environment in a big way. Americans were driving large cars that ran on leaded gasoline. Factories, chemical plants, oil industries were booming but so was the production of air pollution and environmental waste. Unlike today, the health of the planet was not a high priority for most people primarily because they were unaware of the dangerous side effects of common everyday practices.

Small groups of individuals were, however, aware of the deterioration of the world around them and began to take steps to inform the public. In 1962 author Rachel Carson published her book *Silent Spring* which painted the picture for the environmental decline and raised awareness about preserving the planet. The devastating oil spill in Santa Barbara, California in 1969 was the final push Wisconsin Senator Gaylord Nelson needed to launch his campaign for safer industrial practices. He introduced his idea for a "national teach-in on the environment." Senator Nelson chose Republican Congressman Pete McCloskey to serve as his co-chair and Denis Hayes of Harvard University to serve as national coordinator. The team recruited 85 individuals to promote Earth concept across the country.

Thus, on April 22, 1970 the United States celebrated the first Earth Day. More than 20 million people around the U.S. gathered holding rallies, demonstrations, and other activities to promote a clean and safe living environment. Earth Day 1970 worked because it had support from so many types of people—Republicans and Democrats, rich ad poor, city people and country people, bosses and workers. That first Earth Day led to the creation of the US Environmental Protection Agency and the passage of the Clean Air, Clean Water, and Endangered Species acts. Sen. Nelson was awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom—the highest honor given to civilians in the United States—for his role as Earth Day Founder. In 1990 Denis Hayes organized another major campaign for the planet, and Earth Day went global with 200 million people in 141 countries rallying for a clean environment. Today, Earth Day is recognized as the largest secular observance in the world, marked by more than a billion people in 192 countries every year as a day to advocate for action for a healthy planet, and serves as a conscious reminder of how fragile our planet is and how important it is to protect it.

Your Christian Education Team hopes to have an observation of Earth Day 50th Anniversary on April 22 if our current situation improves. Stay tuned for further details.

The Fellowship Committee prays for your continued health and safety, and we look forward to meeting with you in person again soon!



DID YOU REMEMBER?

While the world has been constantly reminded to wash their hands with soap and water for at least 20 seconds, the Centers for Disease Control is also advising to clean "high touch" surfaces everyday. Anything from tabletops and counters, to doorknobs and keyboards are considered "high touch" surfaces by the CDC and are therefore potential breeding ground for germs. One of the most touched surfaces is undoubtedly the cellphone. The device is pressed to the side of our ears, tapped, and swiped. It goes everywhere with us, making it the ideal surface for virus transfer, so it is important to clean your cellphone daily.


