Staying Balanced in the Time of Social Distancing

Have you noticed? Every single commercial on TV now begins with a reassuring phrase like: "In these uncertain times, we are here for you..." whether they are marketing cars, hamburgers, insurance or a dating app. If we ever hope to move forward from a place of uncertainty, we are going to have to name what is making us uncertain.

Our lives are being shaped by of a pandemic. The virus is COVID 19. Lifestyles and the world economy are changing, quickly. It is okay to feel overwhelmed and even afraid. But there are simple things you can do.

Stay socially connected, but limit media consumption. Now isn't the time to absorb the alarming numbers at the top of the hour every hour. Turn off the TV. Put your phone down. Or schedule your usage. Check a couple reliable sources at a particular time each day. Better yet, use your phone like a phone! Call someone; they will be glad to hear your voice. This will also help take your mind off your concerns by talking to someone else about theirs.

**Move your body.** We all need physical exercise. It doesn't have to be rigorous – it can be as simple as walking around your house and noticing where summer is beginning to show up. Or go for a jog. I read that people in Spain are taking their goldfish bowls for walks in order to get outdoors – pet walks are allowed; aimless walking is a guarantine violation. Time to get Goldie a leash!

Maintain a regular sleep pattern. Keep to your before Covid-19 schedule as best as you can. Get up, get dressed, do some things around the house if your schedule allows. Set aside time to work; time for family & outdoors, leave time for meals and cleaning. Try not to get too sluggish. Being a couch potato on Saturday is okay. Being a couch potato everyday just makes you a slug. Try to keep some gentle forward momentum.

Build special occasions into your schedule. If you "watch" church when you used to attend, go ahead and dress up for church. Make a standing phone or Zoom date with friends. Every week, at this time, meet up for a chat. Pistachios and Topo Chico (or beer and pretzels) optional. Do something that makes it a little special. Thanks to virtual happy hours, I talk to my friends every week now.

Maybe you miss your regular Tuesday bridge gathering; call one of your bridge buddies during your regular bridge time – catch up on the rest of the group and how they are getting along right now. Or go high tech and find an online bridge game you could play together.

Most importantly, feed your spirit. Pray, talk to God, read scripture. Write a letter to God in a journal. Or imagine what God would say in a letter to you. Breathe deeply. Start a

gratitude journal; write down a couple things you are thankful for each day. Flip through an old hymnal and read the words or hum the tune to an old favorite.

**Trust** that everyone is facing this time together. **Know** that you have a strong community in the church to love and support you. Transitional times like these are overflowing with **grace**, but we have to muddle through for a bit to discover the possibilities that await us on the other side.  $\sim Rev Michele$
