God is more than Words

God created us with five senses, and yet many times when we reach out to our Maker, we do so with words. We pray verbally. We ask God for help or support in times of need. We try to be thankful, expressing words of gratitude. Sometimes we ask for guidance or seek for God to show us the way. We also sing praises, laments, and thanksgiving. As expressive and moving as our hymns and songs might be, these are another form of *verbal* communion with God.

But we have *five* senses! Beyond the *words* we speak or long to hear, we also experience life though sensations of taste, touch and smell. God is more than we can describe with words. Wouldn't it make sense if God communicated through our other senses too?

Begin exploring your surroundings with your eyes. Sit quietly and comfortably; take a few deep cleansing breaths, and just look around. Just look. Try to escape your critical eye and just observe. Maybe you are inside. Instead of noticing the need to vacuum, allow yourself to see the floor as it is. If there is dust or dirt or pet hair, just observe. Notice the textures of the room. Just look at the way light falls on the objects around you. Are there antiques? Is there a favorite picture or chair? Reflect on how this collection of things have come together. Maybe you are outside. What colors do you see? Is there a breeze rustling the leaves? Is it bright and sunny or overcast? Consider how alive everything is. Trees, birds, insects, even the soil has character. Reconnect with your breath, and give thanks to God. All of these observations are yours alone. All of these gifts, all of the insights and connections you have made come from your spirit connecting with the Spirit of God in the world.

At another time, repeat the process with your senses of smell and sound. It may help to keep your eyes gently closed. You may notice the peat of old leaves, or the wet smell of dew on the grass. You may notice the hint of soap from washing your hands. You might hear cars driving by, the hum of the air conditioner, or gentle snoring from your pet.

All of these sensations remind us that we are part of a world that is more than we can see. Our world is an interconnected web of life, sustained by God. Spend some time noticing creation through your senses, and you may discover something new about our Maker.


