So, I ask, does heaven seem like a place exclusively carved out of the finest wood, colored by the grandest stained-glass, and perpetually hushed so that Gregorian chant is the only sound that fills the air over the susurration of whispered conversation? Perhaps, in the quieter places. But not everywhere! In the visions of heaven John of Patmos describes in Revelation everything is gold and sparkling and dazzling white. The River of Life is surely more than a demurely babbling brook!

I've often imagined heaven as a wide open place, with rolling fields of wildflowers and plenty of room to walk and picnic and take in the glory of nature. This includes plenty of room for my favorite dogs to frolic and play and visit me in the life to come.



Did You Know? -- Earth is amazing!

Earth is a beautiful place and has sustained everything living on it for millions of years. But as beautiful, bold and brave as our Earth is, our presence has done and is doing much damage to her. The good news is we still have a chance to change it. People like you and I are more aware of the needs of our Earth and her environment and we are making changes – necessary changes – to help preserve our world. Protecting and preserving our environment is so much more than just the weather. Our environment is all the animals, plants and humans.

Some environmental facts that you need to know:

- ◆ Human consumption of Earth's natural resources tripled from 1970-2015 and is expected to again double from 2015 to 2050;
- According to NASA, if the current rate of destruction continues, the world's rainforests will be gone by 2100;
- ◆ If current patterns continue, we will have emptied the world's oceans for seafood by 2050.
- ◆ Water, water everywhere but not a drop to drink only 1-2% of the total Earth's water is drinkable (the other 97% is salt water and glaciers). If we keep doing what we are doing, "There will be no water by 2040" (Prof. Benjamin Sovacool, Aarhus University, Denmark).
- 27,000 trees are cut down each day so we can have Toilet Paper!
- Aluminum can be recycled continuously. Recycling 1 aluminum can save enough energy to run our TVs for at least 3 hours. 80 trillion aluminum cans are used every year.
- Plastic bags and plastic materials in the ocean, kills as many as 1 million sea creatures annually.
- The world's oldest trees are more than 4,600 years old.

The first Sunday in October is designated as World Communion Sunday, which celebrates our oneness in Christ with all our brothers and sisters around the world. Paul tells us that we are to "discern the body" when we partake of Holy Communion, mindful that we note our relationship to all our brothers and sisters in Christ in the celebration. One is not to go hungry while another is drunk! (I Cor. 11:21). This is scandalous behavior opposed to the Way of Christ. Thus it is appropriate that World Communion Sunday is also a time when we receive the annual Peace and Global Witness Offering as a way of continuing the ancient Christian practice of sharing what we have with brothers and sisters in need.

A Presbyterian Gift

World Communion Sunday (originally called World Wide Communion Sunday) is a gift of the Presbyterian Church to the larger ecumenical church. The first celebration occurred at Shadyside Presbyterian Church in Pittsburgh, PA, in 1933 where Dr. Hugh Thompson Kerr served as pastor.

Celebration of World Wide Communion Sunday was adopted as a denominational practice in the Presbyterian Church (US) in 1936. Churches in other denominations were invited to celebrate with us from the beginning, but it wasn't until 1940 when the Department of Evangelism of the Federal Council of Churches (a predecessor body of the National Council of Churches) promoted extending the celebration to a number of churches around the world that the practice became widespread. Today, World Communion Sunday is celebrated around the world, demonstrating that the church founded on Jesus Christ peacefully shares God-given goods in a world increasingly destabilized by globalization and global market economies based on greed.

At First Presbyterian Church Henderson, we are marking World Communion in a special way this year. We are sending home mini-loaves of bread and juice with those who attend on October 4, and delivering these elements to our homebound members. The table prayers we will use on Thursday for our virtual Eucharistic celebration, as well as some of the prayers we will use in worship on October 4, are adapted from a special Order of Worship compiled for this occasion by Presbyterian Mission Agency, Special Offerings.
