Giving and Taking

It is Lent: the time of preparation and waiting, self-examination and repentance.

Lent lasts 40 days, like the flood, Moses' time at Mt Sinai, Jonah's time in Nineveh, and the time of Jesus' testing in the wilderness. The paraments are purple, similar to the purple/blue we use for Advent, another season of waiting. What are we to do during this spring season?

These forty days that lead us to the glory of Easter resurrection are a time of giving up and taking on. We make sacrifices to connect us to and help us remember the sacrifice that Christ made for us in his death. We take on practices that bring us closer to God and neighbor and deepen our practice of love. The extra time and donations we make to the food pantry, Meals on Wheels, Presbyterian Disaster Assistance and others, connect us directly with the needs of our community. The Friday meat that we skip, the desserts that we go without, are gestures of our willingness to show restraint.

In the lectionary, our gospel readings for this year come primarily from Mark. But for Lent, we take a detour through John for weeks 3-5. This is a little disorienting until we consider the arc that joins each Sunday's readings together. On Lent 1, all four passages followed a path from the death-dealing waters of the flood to the life-giving waters of baptism and the Spirit descending upon Jesus from a gaping hole torn open in the heavens.

The change that comes into our lives from these forty days of giving up and taking on can be just as dramatic. There is nothing subtle about the death and resurrection of our Messiah. We mark this time with basic and tactile elements. From the ashen crosses on our foreheads to the cross of Good Friday, from the splashing waters at the font to the waters of the servant-act of foot washing, we make connections between ourselves and the death and resurrection. We hold rough nails made of iron, damp green palms, smooth wooden crosses andfinally—blossoming flowers on Easter morn. The promise of the empty tomb remains our hope throughout. Even in this pandemic-scared hands-off era, we touch these things and they remind us to give up and take on for Christ who took on flesh and gave his life on the cross for us.

May your lent be fulfilling,

The Outreach Committee met via Zoom. In addition to addressing the mission of our Outreach, we also welcomed new members to our Team --Tom Weaver and Elizabeth Marvel.

We confirmed our financial and spiritual commitments to continue to: Grace Presbytery, HIM, Presbyterian Children's Home and Services, Rusk/Panola County Children's Advocacy Center, and Camp Gilmont. In addition, the Team reaffirmed our participation in the four Presbytery Special Offerings and designated Champions for each offering.

The first special offering is **One Great Hour of Sharing (February 17 – April 4, 2021)** and our designated Champion is John Tieken. The second special offering is **Pentecost (April 5 – May 23, 2021)** with designated Champion Jimmy Chapman.

Our third special offering is **Peace & Global (September 5 – October 3, 2021)** being championed by Claudia Morgan-Gray.

The Outreach Team also reviewed and reaffirmed our **Adopt A Block** schedule as the 3rd Monday of every other month. The weather outside prevented us from our February 15th Adopt A Block – so it is rescheduled for **March 15th!** You don't have to be on the Committee to come walk the block with us. It is good together time and our neighbors are always glad to see us.

The Team approved accepting an invitation from the Henderson Middle School Sunshine Committee to adopt either a HMS class or staffing area. We decided to adopt Katie Hurst's Science Department and her classes. We are coordinating now to finalize our "adoption" and get the information to begin a regular communication and surprise treat to our adoptee group.

As a Team, we also approved beginning a weekly "Hustle Kindness" commitment. We have deemed every Friday as "Hustle Kindness Friday" where each member of the Team will try to do at least one random act of kindness for a stranger or for someone they know. It is a Committee commitment; however, we very much invite and encourage our whole congregation to participate in Hustling Kindness.

DID YOU KNOW?

Did you know that for almost 30 years, NFL Green, the NFL's environmental and sustainability program, has managed community greening initiatives for the sports league. NFL Green works to mitigate the environmental impact of the NFL's major events in each community that hosts Super Bowl, Pro Bowl and the NFL Draft and creates a "green" legacy. Each season, these culminate with "Green Week" before the big event, with projects undertaken by the NFL and the Super Bowl Host Committee benefitting each host community. Efforts include recovering food, recycling and waste management, donating used event and building materials and offsetting energy for events.

This green legacy has also included a touch of blue in the last two years, meaning conservation efforts also focused on the waters of host cities Miami in 2020 and then in Tampa in Super Bowl 55. Miami Green Week activities included planting 100 endangered staghorn corals in Biscayne Bay. This year, the effort expanded to "100 Yards of Hope," a football field-sized coral restoration project off the coast of South Florida. The end zones and center of the field-sized reef were placed in fall 2020, followed by divers planting thousands of staghorn and mountainous star corals recently. Helping with these plantings, was Force Blue—a nonprofit that retrains former special operations veterans and combat divers to assist in marine conservation efforts. "This critically important project is helping to restore Florida's Coral Reef, the third-largest barrier reef in the world, which is in crisis," says Deborah Luke, the Senior Vice President of Conservation for The Florida Aquarium. The Force Blue also removed almost a ton of debris January 25 from the Spanish Rocks Reef offshore of Holmes Beach with the help of NFL Green, Tampa Bay Super Bowl LV Host Committee, PepsiCo, and The Florida Aquarium.

NFL Green projects are hands-on and make a lasting difference in each host community—one that remains long after the big event has ended. Since its beginning in 1993, NFL Green has earned recognition for Super Bowl as the greenest professional sports event in America.
