### **DID YOU KNOW?**

Did you know that Vatican City is now powered by solar energy? Pope Francis had a dream that the Vatican would run entirely on green energy. Since his 2015 encyclical "Laudato Si," Pope Francis was a firm defender of climate action and repeatedly appealed to the international community to take swifter and more decisive measures. He wanted to highlight the need "to make a transition to a sustainable development model that reduces greenhouse gas emissions into the atmosphere, setting the goal of climate neutrality." In 2024 to model what this could look like, he announced that an agrivoltaic solar plant would be installed on a Vatican-owned property outside Rome, and the power generated from that could supply all of Vatican City's energy needs. An agrivoltaic solar plant is one that involves the dual use of land for solar energy production and agriculture. These plants are built with a series of solar panels that coexist with crops, livestock or both. Sometimes the solar arrays are situated on top of greenhouses, interwoven among crops, or elevated above them.

Fast forward to 2025, and the project is completed. The last steps were taken with the installation of panels on the Paul VI Audience Hall and the Courtyard of the Corazze entrance to the Vatican Museums inside the Vatican City. That Pope Francis cared about planet Earth will always be a part of his legacy.

By the way, have you seen Rusk County's own Solar Farm? Travel out Chicken Feather Road (Hwy 782) about 3-5 miles and there are solar panels on both sides of the road.
